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¹ Vesiculobullous lesions, described in Table 8, frequently present as ulcerative lesions following rupture of the vesicles or bullae.
² Various other neoplasms which primarily present as swellings or masses may become ulcerated due to trauma or necrosis, e.g. ulcerated malignant salivary gland neoplasms.

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
